

A Constant SigEp Shares from the Heart

Alfred "Al" Green '47 – Life Began at Oklahoma Alpha

Alfred "Al" Green '47 was born in 1923, in Cordell, Oklahoma. His life story is one of true love and deep friendships. Al's family were dairy farmers, but Al had different ideas for his future. He attended Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, Oklahoma, known then as Oklahoma A&M, and majored in animal husbandry, now known as animal science. "I pledged the Oklahoma Alpha chapter of SigEp because my friends and family were part of the fraternity." Familiar fraternity brother faces for Al were the late **Steve Synar '44** and his younger brother, the late **Edmond Synar '48**.



One of Al's best memories is traveling to Norman, Oklahoma, to initiate the Beta Chapter of SigEp at the University of Oklahoma. Following in his footsteps, two of Al's grandsons were members of the Beta Chapter at the University of Oklahoma, **Mike Hewitt '96** and **Chris Hewitt '99**. Al and Mike recently attended a re-dedication of the chapter house at Stillwater alma mater and he was honored at the ceremony.

But by far the most important memory for Al was meeting his wife, Anita Letts, a Chi Omega, who lived next door to him during college. "We fell in love early and started our careers together." Al recalls the day he decided to buy Anita her engagement ring, "My younger cousin and I always attended a rodeo after Thanksgiving in Elk City. We weren't by any means rodeo stars and mostly rode donkeys, but that night we got talked into riding a brand-new bull for a nice sum

of money. All I had to do was ride the bull out of the gate and jump off." That night after the rodeo, Al came home with his winnings and asked his mother's permission to buy Anita's engagement ring.

After Al and Anita graduated in 1947, they were wed that fall on August 2. Al began his career as an agriculture teacher in Dill City alongside Anita in the same school. A few years later they moved to Lawton, Oklahoma, where he continued teaching and opened an FFA chapter as well as a high school vocational agriculture program. His vocational ag teams won many awards. After five years of teaching in Lawton, Al shifted gears and began his work in the feed additive industry, working for Superior Feed Mills and American Cyanamid. Because he was frequently away from his family with these jobs, he decided it was time to establish permanent roots closer to home. "That's when I bought Muskogee Seed Company in Muskogee, Oklahoma. We had five salesmen covering Arkansas and Oklahoma. Walmart was the first company to sell our product." He sold the company in 1982 with the intent to retire, but his love of community called him out of retirement to manage the local United Way Campaign for the next 13 years.

Al shares that his life all started with SigEp. Meeting his wife and creating lifelong relationships were the foundation of an everlasting bond with Oklahoma Alpha. Al is thankful for all the memories and times he shared with his brothers at Oklahoma Alpha.

Cost of Education Continues to Climb

What This Means for OK Alpha Collegians

It's no secret that the cost of college continues to increase. Hundreds of headlines each year display the increased dollars students are facing. *So what does that look like across the nation?*

According to fall 2016 enrollment data from College Board, the average tuition and fees at an in-state public college are \$9,716 for the 2018-19 year, \$21,629 for an out-of-state student, and to \$35,676 for a private university.

How does Oklahoma State University stack up to the national average?

The Oklahoma State University website outlines tuition and fees for full-time students living on/off campus in 2018-19 as \$11,610. This is just the cost of tuition and enrollment fees each semester. Housing, books, transportation, and general cost of living expenses add another approximately \$15,190 in expenses per student. Out-of-State students have an additional \$15,520 annually in expenses.

As education costs remain on the rise, alumni support of OK Alpha becomes extremely vital. Scholarship resources and competitive housing costs make a huge difference for our undergraduate brothers. Reach out to our AVC to see how you can get involved in aiding the chapter.



Parent's Club Supports the Oklahoma Alpha Men Throughout the Year

Oklahoma Alpha has had a long-standing tradition of a strong Parent's Club. With the opening of the new chapter house, this group of loyal volunteers continues to find ways to make the chapter house a better living experience for the men. In the fall of 2018, the Parent's Club provided funds for two additional washer/dryer sets to complement the four provided by the AVC.

Recently, the Parent's Club purchased tables for our two study rooms. Now, instead of just studying in the one big room in the chapter house, or in their rooms, the men can study in groups in two locations dedicated solely to studying. With the fall 2018 GPA for the house standing at 3.37, these added features helped make a difference.

The Parent's Club also contributes by providing funds to send more men to training sessions at Carlson Leadership Academy, as well as Conclave. The group is aware of a central need of college men: food. The Parent's Club finds numerous opportunities to keep the men fed by providing meals for all-night pomp at Homecoming, finals week, Freshman Follies one night before the show, and Varsity Revue one night before show.

Chapter Wins Varsity Revue and Chapter Home of the Year

In February, 12 men and two advisors attended the Carlson Leadership Academy in Dallas, Texas.
